Learning a good work ethic is very important for teenagers and Mount Pisgah Academy takes this form of education seriously. Students who attend MPA are assigned jobs each year and are paid minimum wage. The hours they work not only give them an opportunity to earn money towards their school bill, but students also receive a grade for their work that goes on their school transcript.

There are a variety of student jobs available such as working in maintenance: cutting lawns and doing yard work, assisting with repairs, picking up trash, etc. Students work in the dormitories to answer phones, clean the dorms, and as RA's or Resident Assistants. (A resident assistant is in charge of the students on their halls, and an extension of the deans). Students work in the library, grade papers for teachers, clean the classrooms, answer phones, work in the office, schedule outreach in the community, work with retirees through the ASSIST Program, help plan and lead out in religious services, assist with IT work, and help with meal preparations in the cafeteria.

Phil Thomas, Cafeteria Director said, "The cafeteria could not be run without our student workers. They learn skills here that will be useful all throughout their life, such as being on time, following instructions, listening to their supervisor, being a team player, as well as how to prepare food. Working with the kids is a lot of fun."

The staff depend heavily on the work that the students do and trust them with not only sensitive or confidential information, but also with important tasks such as counting and receipting money, adding up bank deposits, recruiting and marketing duties, and many other things.

Sharon Duque, a junior at MPA, said that she "enjoys counting money and filing in the office." Becky Amann, also a junior, likes "meeting a lot of interesting people while answering the school phone."

Our students are a joy to work with and the staff love the personal relationships and lifelong friendships that are developed with the students through work, and life in general at MPA. A student that graduated a few years ago once told me that "this is the only school I've ever attended where I consider the staff to be my best friends."

A really cool part of the main museum was a place where you could walk through a simulation battle letting you experience what a battle might have felt like. Josh Bedwell, '22 commented that he "enjoyed the individual experience walking through." It was a very interactive experience that kept us all interested and entertained.



Finally, we went to Colonial Williamsburg. Here, we learned more about pre-war times, the years when Britain was colonizing America. By visiting the governor's palace and the rest of the town, I learned more about the society of false freedom. We got to see how the common people made a living, which included a stop to a very small sheep breeder. "The baby sheep were really cute and lovable," Becky Amann, '22 said. Aside from cute sheep though, we unfortunately also learned about the harsher things, such as being executed for crimes, or just being a slave because of your race.
